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Introduction



Who?

- The author of this letter is the apostle Paul. However, it is addressed from both Paul and his partner in ministry, Timothy.
- The audience in who Paul is writing to is the believers in the church of Philippi.

What?

• Around this time period of this letter being written, a lot is happening in Pauls' ministry. Paul makes his first trip to Philippi somewhere between 50-52 AD. His second trip, which led to more success in sharing the gospel, was between 53-57 AD. In 59-60 AD Paul takes his trip to Rome which ultimately lands him under house arrest from 60-62 AD. Just two yeas later a fire will destroy Rome. Rome's infamous Emperor Nero accused Christians for the fire which results in Paul being martyred and many others Christians soon meeting the same demise.

When?

 Paul founded the church of Philippi somewhere around 50-52 AD. However, this letter is believed to have been written sometime between 60 and 62 AD.

Where?

- Paul wrote this letter while he is in prison. Historians believe the location of his imprisonment was likely Rome but could have been Ephesus.
- Philippi was a Roman colony located on a major trade road through Macedonia.

Why?

• Paul wrote this letter for a multitude of reasons. First, he writes it for the sake of encouraging those in the church of Philippi while also informing them of his current circumstances. Secondly, he writes to them for the sake of reminding them of the life that they have in Christ and the example that Jesus set for them. Thirdly, he writes to them so that they may take heart in knowing that he will be sending to them both Epaphroditus and Timothy for support. Finally, he writes a warning to them about the dangers of considering the law over their faith in Christ. He gives thanks to them for their support and gifting's in the Lord, and closes out his letter in the grace of Christ Jesus. All of this points towards the theme of ultimately having contentment.
